Long Islanders and the Office of Strategic Services and Its Successor, the Central Intelligence Agency

The 24,000 member OSS operated overseas on a worldwide basis during World War II with the exception of the Pacific theater where it was banned by Douglas MacArthur. Its budget, which at times appeared to be limitless, was shrouded in war-time expenditure. To date, neither the CIA's budget nor the number of employees has been publicly disclosed. It had access to over one hundred and seventy charitable organizations through which it could channel funds to various projects.

In a few instances members of the OSS and CIA were youths when they resided on Long Island or subsequently married spouses who were Long Island residents. For those individuals, a notation has been made for them to direct the reader to the appropriate entry in our *Long Island's Prominent Families* volumes. Other members of the OSS and CIA can be found under their surname entries.
